# **Project overview**

### Aims and goals

- » Focus (but not exclusively) on Anglophone Caribbean and Diaspora literature
- » Promoting awareness of often-neglected or lesser known authors of the 20th century and beyond
- » Encouraging today's writers to recognize the value of their own author archives

### Who's involved?

- » Project led by Alison Donnell (University of East Anglia) with major grant from Leverhulme Trust
- » Large, collaborative, international team of scholars, students, writers, and librarians
- » At UF, included librarians affiliated with dLOC and graduate students

- » Caribbean Authors'
  Papers is a starting point for locating manuscripts, correspondence, etc. across international collections. How could we turn a spreadsheet into a navigable data source?



# G is for Beryl Gilroy (1924–2001)

Ithough Beryl Gilroy is probably A known to most readers of Caribbean literature for her fictional works published in the 1980s and 1990s, her commitment to writing and to Caribbean readers dates back to the 1960s and is also testimony to her life-long work as an educator. Born in Skeldon Village, Guyana, in 1924, Gilroy obtained a teaching diploma in Guyana before migrating to the United Kingdom in 1951, where she completed a degree in English and Psychology and later attained a doctorate in Counseling Psychology. Part of the Windrush generation, whose experiences are poignantly articulated in her writing, Gilroy initially struggled to find work on account of racism.

Gilroy's novels capture life in both the Caribbean and in Britain with a particular focus on the lives of black women, children and the elderly, as seen in first novels Frangipani House (1986) and Boy-Sandwich (1989) both published in the Heinemann Caribbean Writers series. In 1991, the novel Stedman and Joanna: A Love in Bondage and the poetry collection Echoes and Voices were published with Vantage. Her novels In Praise of Love and Children (1996), Inkle and Yarico (1996), Gather the Faces (1996), and The Green Grass Tango (2001) were published by Peepal Tree Press, together with her autobiographically-informed story collection, Sunlight on Sweet



### Reflections

### Recommendations

- » Building trust means acknowledging everyone's expertise
- » Start as early as possible to strategize, even if library won't join until later
- » Set parameters and document roles and responsibilities
- » Including students often means taking extra time, but can enrich the project

- » External review, feedback, and revision
- » Continuing outreach to researcher, writer, and student audiences
- » Documenting plan for long-term preservating and archiving
- » Building on this case study for current dLOC grant
