## **Hindering factors for inclusion and equal opportunities**

- \* Dropout rates
- \* Language policies and the mother tongue
- \* Curriculum: Caribbean and/or Dutch oriented
- \* Student care and student support
- \* Teacher support and lifelong learning
- \* Parental support
- \* Alignment to the labor market
- \* Low success rates Caribbean students in the Netherlands ....
- \* .... leading to Brain Drain.
- \* Education, finances and governance.

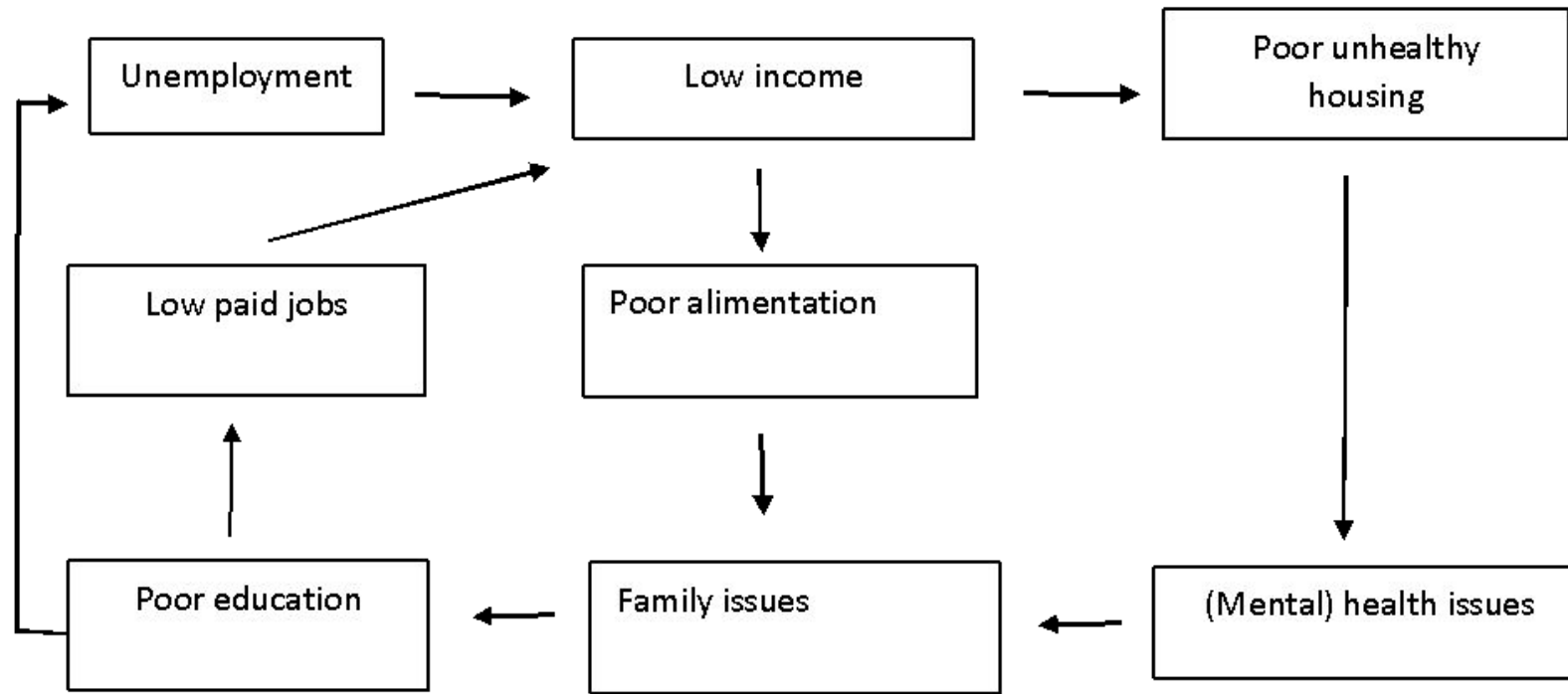
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## VULNERABLE GROUPS AND URGENT NEEDS IN THE DUTCH CARIBBEAN

- \* Migrants and (mostly Venezuelan) refugees

## DUTCH CARIBBEAN LIBRARIES: JOINT CHALLENGES

- \* Data for evidence-based policies
- \* Lack of Multi-lingual book collections (Papiamentu, English, Dutch, Spanish)
- \* Membership and outreach to most vulnerable groups
- \* Public funding and governmental priorities
- \* Scale and (physical, digital) infrastructure
- \* Staff: aging professionals, lack of trained staff
- \* Vulnerability for external shocks

# TOWARDS A CARIBBEAN-DUTCH NETWORK APPROACH

## **Dutch Caribbean libraries in the driver's seat**

- \* Build consensus and goals for Kingdom network collaboration.
- \* Joint lobby towards local Caribbean and Dutch governments.

## **National Library of the Netherlands**

- \* Mediator: connect with Dutch Foundation for Provincial Support Institutions ('POI')
- \* Mediator: Twinning DC – Dutch Libraries
- \* Expertise Centre for knowledge transfer, (digital, material) infrastructure, projects, et cetera

## **A search for wider Caribbean collaboration:**

- \* Explore potentials of wider Caribbean collaboration.
- \* A role for ACURIL?



DUTCH-CARIBBEAN DIALOGUES FOR THE 21 CENTURY  
*SOME PRELIMINARY CONSIDERATIONS*

- \* Discuss realistic quality standards for Dutch Caribbean libraries for the 21 century
- \* Define language policies based on local language situation
- \* Specify (specific and general) strategies for capacity enhancement Dutch Caribbean libraries
- \* Strengthen collaboration with schools, (adult) education and NGOs
- \* Define realistic integrated national *SDG End Poverty* Library strategies and partnerships
- \* Free membership for the youth and other vulnerable groups
- \* Collect Data (WSOB) for fact-based policies.
